EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

I am often asked how we remain as determined as we are given the relentless tide of challenges that we face, on a daily basis, on this conservation front line. Honestly, I don't really have a way to answer that. It's just the way we are made. The painted dogs are the epitome of the voiceless; they are innocent killers; and victims of mankind's inhumanity, thoughtlessness, and greed. They deserve and need as many champions as they can get and we are certainly determined to play our part in that regard. Are we optimistic? I guess collectively we are. By nature I am not, but I am the most determined, and live in hope that the tide will one day turn.

Drought was the over- arching "natural" phenomenon we had to deal with. I say natural phenomenon with reluctance because we all know (or live in denial) that mankind is negatively impacting our environment more than ever.

In 2019 we witnessed the demise of all but two of the Destiny pack, several killed by lions in these conflict zones around waterholes. As a result, the dogs are being driven into marginal zones and consequently struggle. To further compound the situation, the marginal areas often abut communal lands and poaching hotspots. We expended an extraordinary amount of effort and resources trying to protect the McDonalds pack.

Honestly it feels like the whole year brought nothing but challenges of this nature and for those who know me very well, you know why I would in particular feel that way about 2019. However the reality is that there were more highs than lows.

Ultimately it is your support that makes the difference. Without you we cannot achieve anything and we remain eternally grateful for all you do for us.

The Zimbabwe National Pack may be regarded as a keystone of importance to the maintenance of dog populations in Southern Africa. Zimbabwe remains as a painted dog stronghold with an estimated seven hundred dogs.

Hwange National Park (HNP) has recorded a slight recovery in painted dog population since 2016, brought about by more pups in breeding units, more pups surviving to adulthood, being linked to plenty rainfall and prey species, thus healthier alpha females. The Gwayi areas outside HNP are still considered a sink habitat for dogs and herbivory. The McDonald's pack, Mpindo pack, Kali pack, Django pack range beyond HNP and have resulted in mortality and injuries, during the reporting period, as a result of anthropogenic induced factors.

MID ZAMBEZI VALLEY - MANA POOLS

The successful recapture and translocation of the Mpindo Pack to the relative safety of Mana Pools was a particular highlight.

There is a growing concern surrounding the disturbance of painted dogs in Mana pools. While the painted dogs are a "must see" for many visitors, which translates as a big plus for the species in Mana pools, this enthusiasm needs to be carefully managed and monitored as painted dogs have an intrinsic ecological benefit and do have a massive tourist potential to balance.

ZERO TOLERANCE TO WILDLIFE CRIME

Illegal hunting activities featuring the use of wire snares (animal traps) is the biggest cause of mortality for painted dogs outside of protected areas. To mitigate this PDC has been operating professionally trained anti-poaching units since 2001.

The biggest challenge remains inappropriate and inadequate land management by fellow stakeholders. None of the safari concession holders operate anti-poaching units and in most cases the areas have no significant management presence at all. This is further compounded by photographic safari operators maintaining water holes in front of their lodges to attract animals for their clients to see. Creating literal "killing zones" in the process as these areas are targeted by poachers.





Legislation in Zimbabwe is robust in many ways for wildlife crime. However, poachers caught setting snares are handled with extreme leniency in most cases.

One such case was with the McDonalds pack alpha female, Fran. She was snared seven times in her life. The poacher who set the snares that finally took her life worked at the nearby safari lodge but claimed he had not been paid for months and had to provide for his family. The Magistrate was sympathetic and he was released with a very light suspended sentence.

We are working with Speak Out for Animals to not only challenge the sentence but to begin work on increasing the level of legal protection for painted dogs so that killing one carries a mandatory 5-9 year jail sentence. That is still work in progress but we will not rest.

48 Conservation Clubs visits It is an unequivocal fact that today's children are tomorrow's wildlife custodians and they need to be educated about the various problems facing endangered species, with this in mind PDC established a Children's Bush Camp in 2004.

Here an extended experiential education programme has been designed, linked to the National Curriculum for grade six children, with a philosophy aimed at affecting healthy developments in the perspectives, attitudes and feelings of the students towards the environment.

23 camps were conducted in the free of charge program. This included the new Mpindo Primary School who had been promised inclusion in 2019 as a reward for the community who had reacted positively by looking after the dogs that had resided in their area. Despite of all the predation of goats, the community still did not take drastic action to kill the dogs or destroy the den.

Being the first students from that school it was quite interesting to note that the children had some information about painted dogs and the Bush Camp learnt from thier neighbours at Ngamo school who have been attending the camp since 2004.



The effects of the Happy readers program was felt in the core operating area with Mabale and St Francis Primary Schools coming up with above 60% passes at Grade 7 and being in the top 15 in Hwange District. This shows that most schools could have done better had they been part of the reading program 6 years ago. The two schools have had the books since 2014. Four donor schools came to camp though nine had booked and five cancelled due to failure by parents to pay for the trip. It's hoped that with an improved economy more schools will be coming.



PDC HIV / AIDS HEALTHCARE PROGRAM

The PDC healthcare, in partnership with Wild4Life, program provides for the health of the human population in the core operating area. By this, we assume that there will be an increase in the knowledge of PDC Aims and Objectives hence an increase in positive attitude towards nature by people in our core operating area. Through formal and informal education programs, the level of knowledge, understanding and empathy for Painted Dogs and nature, as a whole will increase.

We initially expanded the HIV/AIDS healthcare program activities from the areas surrounding PDC to cover the Hwange district with a population of 141629.

At the request of the Ministry of Health in Zimbabwe (MOHCW), in 2019 we went further to include Binga district which enabled us to reach out to its population of 128000.

Both districts are located in Matabeleland North province of Zimbabwe and they bring together a total of 32 health centres that we now work with to improve healthcare delivery in these rural areas.



As a result she was at times stationed at either Lukosi hospital or Victoria Falls hospital, when government ambulances were out-of-service. This shows how important in the district the ambulance is, instead of serving the five PDC clinics around Dete, it covered the whole district.




